






About Douglas

- 12,500 people
- 2,428km²
- Divided by the Daintree River and ferry
- Surrounded by Wet Tropics World Heritage Area
- On the international map but significantly isolated
- 2.7m average annual rainfall
- 7 Communities

Community-led Action

Community-led identification of community need Collaborative approaches to address resilience actions



Local Disaster Management Action

Community need is transferred to local disaster management plans and LDMG facilitated or coordinated actions



Greater Resilience

During disaster events, tangible improvements in resilience are measured and community outcomes improved

All stakeholders reflect and learn to enhance understanding and identify collaborative resilience improvements

Using story maps to highlight roles and responsibilities - what's in your sphere of influence?






